As I reflect on my first year as Executive Director, I am proud to share how our organization matured in both structure and strategy—building on a foundation of trusted relationships to deliver deeper, more scalable impact for the students we serve. This year, we advanced our technology infrastructure, streamlined our coaching systems, and extended our reach beyond Nashville by advising peer organizations across the country in designing effective persistence programs rooted in equity and care.

We did this at a time when higher education is being questioned, and opportunities for historically marginalized students are being increasingly restricted. In the face of these challenges, Persist doubled down on its mission: to ensure that more MNPS graduates—particularly first-generation students and students of color—not only access college, but complete it.

THE RESULTS SPEAK VOLUMES.

- Over 1,250 students received individualized coaching through key milestones like FAFSA completion and course registration.
- We celebrated with 258 students as they crossed the finish line to earn their degrees or certificates.
- Our coaching model informed persistence strategies in other communities, expanding our influence beyond Nashville.

Our work is grounded in the belief that every student deserves the support and guidance to achieve their postsecondary goals. That belief, combined with your ongoing support, made this year possible.

We are growing with clarity and conviction—because our students' futures demand nothing less.

In today's evolving higher education landscape, the path to college is increasingly complex—especially for first-generation students. These students often face barriers well before they step on campus, questioning not just how to get to college, but whether it's even possible. At Persist, we believe this journey should be filled with support, clarity, and momentum.

By 2031, 72% of jobs in the U.S. will require some form of postsecondary education or training (FirstGen Forward, n.d.). Firstgeneration students—now over half of all undergraduates (8.2 million nationally)—are critical to building a competitive, diverse, and equitable workforce. Their success is not just a personal milestone, but an economic necessity.

Yet these students often face challenges such as navigating enrollment,

completing financial aid, working while studying, and accessing career prep—without the inherited knowledge many of their peers take for granted. The transition from high school to college is especially high-risk.

Persist meets students where they are.

Last year, our first-generation students exchanged nearly 5,000 text messages with our coaches—asking about FAFSA, tuition bills, class registration, and more. Our real-time, tech-enabled support model directly addresses "summer melt," helping students enroll at technical colleges, community colleges, and universities across Tennessee.

Our support continues well beyond day one. We partner with colleges, community organizations, and MNPS to provide high-touch, data-informed

coaching throughout the first year and beyond. This is essential: while one-third of students are first-gen, only 27% earn a degree within four years (Whitley, Benson, & Wesaw, 2018).

The long-term payoff is powerful: **first-gen college success could produce 4.4 million additional graduates and \$700 billion** in economic impact (FirstGen Forward, n.d.). With bold partnerships and shared commitment, we can close opportunity gaps—and open doors for generations to come.

Since coaching the very first Persist Scholars back in 2019, we have made it our mission to create an organization that could support students for years to come. One piece of consistent guidance we received in the early days was to begin building a "Fee for Service" program, so that Persist had a diversified stream of financial support. Fee for Service can take on many different meanings within different organizations. At Persist, the goal of Fee for Service is to empower fellow non-profit organizations to more effectively serve their students. We do this work in two primary ways: through providing coaching and/or licensing access to our Salesforce platform. This past year, we are proud to have expanded our work to seven partnerships, spread across four states and the District of Columbia.

CASE STUDY: Community Foundation of Greater Chattanooga

The Community Foundation of Greater Chattanooga (CFGC) has provided scholarships to over 5,000 students since 1992. According to CFGC, these scholarships usually go to often overlooked students. One such program is the Together We Can scholarship, which supports students who are the first in their family to attend college and who are considered low income, as measured by the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The Together We Can (TWC) scholarship is unique among CFGC's scholarship portfolio because it provides holistic support that goes far beyond financial aid. Starting this year, CFGC, led by Dr. Stephanie Young, Director of Scholarships, and Quentin Lawrence, Vice President of Community Investment, have partnered with Persist to provide Together We Can scholars with their own coach to support them as they navigate college. Persist is now working with over 70 scholars on their paths to becoming not only the first in their families to attend college, but the first in their families to graduate from college.

Persist was proud to host several impactful events during the 2024–2025 program year, each designed to foster community, strengthen brand awareness, and ensure students feel supported throughout their college journey.

In July 2025, Persist hosted our **3rd annual College Con**, a dynamic preparation event for incoming college freshmen. Students participated in interactive workshops, engaged with a panel of community partners and education professionals, and received personalized support from our coaching team to ensure they felt confident and ready for their first day on campus.

In August 2025, we launched our charity breakfast, **Sunrise to Success**. This inspiring event featured a panel of industry professionals and student leaders who shared personal stories and insights on the significance of first-generation college success. Sunrise to Success served as a powerful platform to celebrate student resilience, highlight community partnerships, and raise awareness about the ongoing work of Persist.

The 2024 Persister Golf Tournament, held in October at Ted Rhodes Golf Course, was a tremendous success. From beautiful weather to strong community turnout, the day exceeded expectations. We were thrilled to welcome sponsors, supporters, and guests for a memorable day of golf and giving.

Special thanks to our Director of Advancement, Emma Volpe, for leading event planning efforts and cultivating impactful community partnerships. We're

During the month of January, In response to the growing issue of food insecurity—affecting over 50% of college students nationwide (FirstGen Forward)—the Persist team volunteered with **Second Harvest Food Bank of Middle Tennessee**, helping assemble food boxes for local residents. Together, we supported the distribution of over 4,000 meals across the Nashville community, reinforcing our commitment to addressing basic needs and ensuring students have the resources necessary to thrive in and out of the classroom.

The 2025 Spring Persist Employment & Internship Fair was a powerful day of

connection and opportunity, bringing together first-generation college students, recent graduates, and 15 leading employers from across Nashville. Designed to help Persisters take the next step in their professional journeys, the event featured resume reviews, one-on-one networking, and direct access to internships and job openings across multiple industries. We are especially grateful to our employer partners and volunteers for sharing their time, insights, and support to make this event a success.

Lastly, we held our **2nd annual Stand-Up For Students Charity Comedy Event** during the month of April 2025. Thank you to our event partners at 800lb Gorilla, the staff at Nashville Zanies, and our wonderful comedians for helping us raise money for continued support of First Gen students.
